The Challenge of Faith

I believe there may be several challenges we could face in our lives regarding faith. The challenges come when there is a crisis in our lives, like when we lose our employment, a loved one, or experience illness. In addition, there is the challenge to contest for the Faith once delivered unto the saints. There is the challenge of self-mastery, dealing with our passions, our sins, our fragile nature, and self-understanding. There is the challenge of accepting sin, sickness, old age, and death. Each of these life challenges can be met with faith. We will discover how faith is used against these challenges in this chapter.

To begin understanding the different challenges of faith, we must understand how by faith we come to understand what is behind these challenges. Hebrews 11: 1 says, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." In some sense, this passage of Scripture is saying that faith is the confident assurance that what we hope for is going to happen. Yet, for instance, how do we reconcile the terminal illness of a loved one, or their death? If we pray in faith that they recover or if we pray in faith that they not die, and they do not recover and they do die – what does that make of my faith? Does that mean we have not met the challenge to believe God in those situations? Sickness and death are realities of this mortal life we live. How can faith assure me during these trying times? How can I know that God is there and that He really cares for my loved ones and me?

Faith acknowledges as reality what is not made plain to the senses – to what we taste, touch, see, hear, and smell. Faith is based upon that fact, acts on it, and is supported by it even when everything we experience seems to deny it. Faith actualizes what we see. This is how the unseen virtues of hope can be visualized. Faith gives what we are hoping for a substantial nature. In times of weakness, it brings us strength. In times of sadness, it brings us joy. Even in the times when we do not feel strong or feel joy, we have the inner conviction we will be strengthened and we will become happy. Faith helps us get an impermeable grasp on what is happening!

St. John Chrysostom says in his Homily XXI on Hebrews X, 1 B #58, p. 465, "Faith needs a generous and vigorous soul, and one rising above all things of sense, and passing beyond the weakness of human reasoning." God gives us His grace as strength! God's joy is our strength! For it is written in Nehemiah 8:10, "Then he said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat, drink the sweet, and send portions to those for whom nothing is prepared; for *this day is holy to our Lord*. Do not sorrow, for the joy of the LORD is your strength." Therefore, faith turns our sorrow into joy, and our weaknesses into strengths. Faith assures us that God is there. Faith assures us of the unseen presence of God, even if we do not feel His presence. Because we must remember that faith sees the unseen. Faith is the conviction of what we cannot feel with our senses at the time.

This IS the challenge of faith – the challenge of believing God! How we believe God is how we will respond to the challenges, we face in our lives. This is not a matter of "I have more faith than you." It is a matter of how we come to understand who we are in our relationship to God. God WILL reveal Himself to us in these challenges. How we manage, our faith will determine that reality. Real faith is based upon our understanding. We must understand initially that within God and faith there is mystery. We cannot put it into human terms or experience what ultimately cannot be expressed. Mystery comes from the Greek word "mysterion". The root of this Greek word is "myein" which means "to contemplate." Therefore, within God and faith there is mystery of such profound depth and meaning that they cannot be understood by the human mind. This, once again, is the challenge of faith – the challenge to believe God! St. Gregory of Nyssa said in his book "Life of Moses," "Every concept formed by the intellect to comprehend and circumscribe the divine nature can succeed only in fashioning an idol, not to making God known." With this in mind, let us take the next step in understanding the challenges of faith.

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Hebrews 12:1 states, “Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us.” It must be said that in the challenge of faith, we must put aside everything that will hinder us, bring us down, make us sick, and make us lose sight of the prize. Runners and cyclists who run or ride for miles to win their race all want to be in the best condition possible. In order to climb a mountain or hill, someone who is strong and light will be able to conquer that climb the best. A runner, who is fat, has to work twice as hard as someone who is slim and strong. Poor self-esteem, lack of prayer, sin that has not been dealt with, and other problems can weigh us down in the contest of faith. If there is anything that can weigh us down, we must find out what it is and remove it so we can continue on to victory in the challenge of faith. We must be lean, clean, and strong faith machines!

Earlier I said that faith is the confident assurance that what we hope for is going to happen. Faith is the evidence or proof of things we cannot yet see. Faith is the conviction of their reality or faith perceives these things as real fact when that thing is not yet revealed. Faith trusts in, and relies upon God. Faith is taking God at His Word. Faith and belief are almost the same. Faith is an action word. Faith is a verb and belief is a noun. Remember one thing; God does not sell articles of belief! Belief is the result of faith. Belief is the result of the action taken by faith in God. Belief is the verbal statement of that faith. Faith is a positive action word. In Holy Scripture, we are told that faith without action is dead. Therefore, a Christian is one who speaks the Word of God. A Christian is one who verbally testifies to their faith. A Christian acts on faith. Faith is a gift from God. Every Christian has been given a measure of faith.

The faith God gives is not the same kind of faith you have when you make a deal, and agree to do business in “good faith.” The faith God gives is an enabling to believe God and take Him at His Word. Ephesians 2:8 says, “For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; *it is* the gift of God.” Christians are people of confession. Even though we can struggle through faith, God says that the more hopeless our circumstances, the more likely our salvation! Faith never quits when the darkness of trouble comes along. The darker the room, we see with the eyes of faith a greater need for light. Even in the darkness, with great trouble and care, the more genuine are our prayers. God’s help is always near and always available, we must see that through faith!

There is a battle going on right now within each of us. It is the battle for faith. We must understand that we battle against evil, and against ourselves. We are challenged daily to live moral and ethical lives. We are challenged to live in a right relationship with our friends, co-workers, and family. We are challenged to live in a right relationship spiritually with God. We are to take hold of, to seize upon, and take possession of the faith that God has given us. God has given us weapons for our warfare. We must learn how to use them. We must learn to use them through faith.

The Apostle Paul describes these weapons in his letter to the Ephesians, “Stand therefore, having girded your waist with truth, having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and having shod your feet with the preparation of the gospel of peace; above all, taking the shield of faith with which you will be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked one. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.” (Ephesians 6:14-17) The Sword of the Spirit is an offensive weapon, as a two-edged sword, sharp on both sides, the Word of God is meant to cut deep into the “dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow,” it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart. Each weapon we use requires a certain technique with which to use it. We must fight using the weapons of our warfare with skillful expertise, to destroy the negativity of sin and to conquer the self. We must “pray in the Holy Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayer and requests.” We tighten our belt of truth by reading, studying, and meditating upon the Holy Scriptures. God’s Word is truth. We must actualize the breastplate of righteousness – the fact that we have been made holy by the righteousness of Christ in us through the Holy Spirit. We must wear the shoes, which make us stand firm, and in the ready stance to proclaim the Gospel of peace to those who know no peace. We must wear the helmet of salvation, which gives us the assurance of sins forgiven and a right to the inheritance of being sons and daughters in our relationship with God.

Christians are in a lifelong race. It is like an athletic event. I can identify the race or athletic event as a bicyclist. The challenge of faith is like a bike race. It depends upon your equipment, your physical conditioning, and how much food and water you have to nourish you throughout the contest. Technically, you have to make sure your tires are firm and full of air. Your brakes must work properly to stop you. Your front and rear derailleur must work correctly to shift into the gear you need to swiftly get up that hill, or stomp to the finish line in a sprint.

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You wear a helmet to protect your head if you crash, so you can carry on. You wear gloves to ensure your grip is firm on the handlebars. You must have ridden and trained enough miles and have the strength to succeed in the contest. If you do not, you will be dropped like a lead weight, left behind to mull over your loss. Nourishment is a key factor to winning races. Eating right and taking in the correct foods during a race keeps the energy levels up and will allow you to maintain a pace even when the going gets rough.

The challenge of faith, like a bike race, is based upon preparation and training. We must learn how to manage our faith. We must learn how to trust God. We learn these things by reading the Holy Scriptures, the Holy Fathers, and the teachings of the Church. We learn these things from others who have been through the challenges of faith. We learn these things by participating in the Holy Sacraments of the Church, through which we obtain knowledge of the divine and spiritual nourishment. The challenges of faith actually help us grow our faith. That is where we keep praying, keep hoping, keep loving, and keep running or ridding the race with endurance and perseverance. We will continue to grow in holiness and will participate in the divine nature of God.

The Apostle Peter in his letter 2 Peter 1:2-11 tells us how faith grows, “Grace and peace be multiplied to you in the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord, as His divine power has given to us all things that *pertain* to life and godliness, through the knowledge of Him who called us by glory and virtue, by which have been given to us exceedingly great and precious promises, that through these you may be partakers of the divine nature, having escaped the corruption *that is* in the world through lust. Also for this very reason, giving all diligence, add to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge, to knowledge self-control, to self-control perseverance, to perseverance godliness, to godliness brotherly kindness, and to brotherly kindness love. For if these things are yours and abound, *you will be* neither barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. For he who lacks these things is short-sighted, even to blindness, and has forgotten that he was cleansed from his old sins. Therefore, brethren, be even more diligent to make your call and election sure, for if you do these things you will never stumble; for so an entrance will be supplied to you abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.”

The ultimate prize we contend for in the challenge of faith is our salvation. That salvation is a present salvation and a future salvation. This present salvation is a struggle; we suffer, and endure great stress. Day after day, we seek that which was lost. We look in the highways and byways of our past; we shake the shrubs and hedges of our minds; we comb the fields of time for the life that is within us. We seek hope, life, happiness, and freedom. We can find all of these through faith. The challenge of faith is to contend in the battle for your soul. It is a fight that CAN be won. We must exert ourselves to the utmost, even though it may be costly and agonizing. We deny ourselves and at the same time give to ourselves in this competition, which we call life. This is the challenge – the challenge of faith. The challenge is to believe God when everyone and everything else points to hurt, pain, loss, envy, anxiety, helplessness, hopelessness, and depression. We can be victorious in the challenge of faith.

What is sad is that faith is so simple; yet can be hidden deep within us; circling within us, yet we do not notice. Jesus said that faith is like a mustard plant seed. These mustard seeds are very, very tiny, but produce a very large plant when properly fertilized, watered, and given plenty of sunlight. How does faith grow? Faith grows and its truth is confirmed by means of its spiritual fruits, which are only known through experience. Remember, faith goes beyond the senses, yet with the senses, faith is experienced. The Apostle Paul instructs us, saying, ‘*Examine yourselves, whether you are in the faith; prove it to yourself. Don't you know within yourself, that Jesus Christ is in you?*’ (2 Cor. 13:5). Faith can and must grow to become mature and lasting. It is this enduring, mature faith that can get us through the darkest times of our lives.
