Candid November Reflections

In the Hands of the Refiner

We have to fight against harboring hurt. Those hurts that someone has done against us, or against someone we either care about or love. Bitterness robs us of joy and peace. Have you ever thought about forgiving someone, then some kind of trigger brings those negative thoughts back to mind? As we mature in Christ, we must ask God to work in us to get rid of those thoughts. We must forgive instantly and continually. What we have to realize is that God is transforming us into the image of His Son, and that the fruit of the Holy Spirit must be manifest in our life. A holy life is the goal, and faith is the key, knowing that God is working in us.

There are questions we have to ask ourselves and ask them all the time. More importantly, we should ask the right questions of ourselves. Asking the right questions would involve the following: 1) Am I obeying God? 2) Am I living a holy life unto God? 3) Does my life reflect Jesus Christ in everything I say or do? 4) Am I praying? 5) Am I devoting myself to the study and meditation of God's Word? 6) Am I giving and hospitable? 7) Am forgiving others as Jesus Christ has forgiven me?

The main question above these is: Do I love God with all of my heart, and all of my soul, and all of my mind and all of my strength, and my neighbor as myself? These are the questions we must be asking themselves every day, 24/7.

I believe that God enables a person to recognize their encounters with God via the Holy Spirit. It may be that as your pastor, I pass along to you through a prophetic word what the Lord desires for you to hear. As your pastor, I would like to take your hand and say, "Let us follow Christ together."

I believe that as your pastor I can aid you in understanding the reason for your existence and the direction God has purposed you to go. Discipleship is going deep into God's Word and hearing what His Word means for us. Upon hearing, we are to obey His Word, and your example of following Christ will glorify God.

It is my task as your pastor to lead you to transformation - not production. Several years ago, I received in the mail a magazine called *The Leadership Journal* published by *Christianity Today*. In the edition, an article entitled "Meet the Dones" spoke about people who have left the church for various reasons. There was a prominent dynamic with everyone the article spoke of regarding those who left. The dynamic was that every one of the people who left the "institutional church" was those who were deeply involved and "worked" extremely hard in their church. Church activities, programs, volunteering, plus many more ways to "contribute." From the article, it seemed like Christianity to these people was just "doing." There was no talk or speak of transformation. There was just production. These people were fed up with "how" things were done.

Therefore, they left blaming the pastors and the people or the councils or the "institution" or the fact that church has a government. People need to be discipled, they should know Law, they should know the Gospel and know the difference between the two. Then, they would come to know freedom in Christ.

Some people say pastors should impact their congregations atmosphere, help people see old things in new ways, and should be followed because of who they are not because of the position they hold. These are all nice descriptions of a charismatic person leading others.

I do not think Jesus modeled leadership this way. Jesus was/is truly human and truly God, and at the same time the Word incarnate delivering salvation, healing, and deliverance to the Jews first, then the Gentiles. He was obedient to God, fulfilled every aspect of the Law and its ordinances. He lived by example God's moral Law. He claimed to be God. He claimed to be the Messiah. He claimed oneness with the Father. All of which are true.

However, can we mere human beings, and pastors, claim that also? No, we are sinners saved by God's mercy and grace, and we must follow His example and follow Him, being enabled by grace and the Holy Spirit to live by faith a Christ like life to the glory of God, and thereby help others to live a life of faith, discipleship, service to God, and others.

When I think about ministry here at Christ Lutheran Church. I think about how effective I am or can be. I have discovered that the marks of an effective pastor are *character*, *courage*, *and total dependence upon God*. I think about this a lot. My thoughts bring to mind several questions.

1) Where do I obtain the character needed to be an effective pastor?

2) Where do I obtain the courage to be an effective pastor, and what is this "courage?"

3) Lastly, in what ways am I dependent upon God as a pastor?

When I think of *character*, especially the character of a pastor, I think of two things. First, 1 Timothy 3:1-7 "This is a faithful saying: If a man desires the position of a bishop, he desires a good work. A bishop then must be blameless, the husband of one wife, temperate, sober-minded, of good behavior, hospitable, able to teach; not given to wine, not violent, not greedy for money, but gentle, not quarrelsome, not covetous; one who rules his own house well, having his children in submission with all reverence (for if a man does not know how to rule his own house, how will he take care of the church of God?); not a novice, lest being puffed up with pride he fall into the same condemnation as the devil. Moreover, he must have a good testimony among those who are outside, lest he fall into reproach and the snare of the devil."

Second, the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self -control. These are character traits of someone living a Spirit-controlled life. A person who has submitted every aspect of his life to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Character is described as the combined features and traits that form the individual nature of a person; one such feature or trait; characteristic; moral or ethical quality; qualities of honesty, courage, integrity, etc. I also think of when I miss the mark – I thank God for His for-giveness and healing. The mark of an effective pastor is a Spirit-filled and Spirit-led characteristic that is the result of a Holy Spirit controlled life.

The second mark, *courage*, is a mark of the *type of character* in a pastor. 1 Corinthians 16:13 says, "Be watchful! Stand firmly in the belief! Be manly! Be strengthened." This is courage. To watch, or be vigilant, against all the evils of which Paul had admonished them, the evils of dissension, or erroneous doctrines, of disorder, of false teachers, etc. To stand firm in holding and defending the truths of the Gospel. Not yielding to any foe, but maintain the truth, and adhere to my confidence in God, my dependence upon God, and to the doctrines of the Gospel with unwavering constancy. To stand firm in maintaining what I believe to be true, and in holding on to my personal confidence in God, notwithstanding all the arts, insinuations, and teachings of seducers and collaborators of false doctrine. To act like a man, to be manly or brave; to show myself as a man; that is, not to be a coward, or timid, or alarmed at enemies, but to be bold and brave.

The third mark is *total dependence upon God*. I am not to be strong for the faith or be strong in myself. My strength comes from the Lord, and in the power of *His might*; from the grace that is in Christ Jesus; believing in Him, looking to Him for strength as well as righteousness; trusting in His power, relying upon Him Whose arm is not shortened; dependent upon His grace, which is always sufficient; to take heart, be of good courage, and fear no enemy because the SOVEREIGN LORD is with me, He is my strength and my shield!

Please pray for me. Please pray that God grant me faith for Spirit-filled *character*, *courage*, and *total dependence upon God*. I desire Him to be your righteousness, your strength, and your shield too.

LESSON ONE INTRODUCTION - APPRENTICESHIP

Joseph, the earthly father of Jesus, was a carpenter who taught his son how to be a carpenter. Jesus learned how to make furniture and build houses as his father's apprentice; by watching, listening, assisting, practicing, asking questions, making mistakes, completing projects, receiving encouragement, correction, and redirection. Sometimes we call this process learning by osmosis. Joseph as master and teacher would be in the best position to determine when his son had achieved a mastery level of carpentry skill, ready to work successfully on his own, and equipped to apprentice others.

Many vocations still rely on the apprenticeship model to teach men and women a craft or trade. Contemporary apprenticeships often include textbooks, online resources, and updated terminology, but the emphasis is still on learning by observing, assisting, and then doing under supervision until the apprentice becomes proficient to work on her own. Trade proficiency is accompanied by degrees of certification that correlate with increased compensation, responsibility, opportunity, and professional status.

Becoming proficient in a craft or trade is a process that requires time, commitment, and hard work, but there is more to vocation than skill proficiency. True vocation requires passion and purpose. Its source is a gifting and calling from God. Similarly, our life in Christ requires passion and purpose, and spiritual transformation is a lifetime process initiated by our heavenly Father who promises to complete the good work He started in us (Philippians 1:6). "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:2)

THE MENTORING RELATIONSHIP

Every successful apprenticeship relies on a strong mentoring relationship. The mentor must be skilled, confident, and invested in the apprentice. The apprentice must be teachable, humble, and committed to the mentor and the process. In the case of our Divine Mentor, He shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8), and our union with Christ and our love for God positions us to become His Beloved Apprentice.

We see many different kinds of mentoring relationships in the Bible and each one has been included by God as an example or model to help us reject conformity to the world and pursue the renewing of our minds that will result in the transformation God desires, commands, and enables for each of us. Notice the beautiful variety of Biblical mentoring relationships.

- Jesus and the Twelve: our Savior calling and mentoring a small group of disciples who would become His sent ones, apostles who would take the Gospel to the world
- Paul and The Church of Ephesus: an apostle who had once been a persecutor of Christians who becomes a spiritual father to the leaders of a large group of new Christians
- Esther by Mordecai: an uncle parenting an orphaned niece who would become a queen
- Ruth by Naomi: a Jewish mother-in-law and a fiercely faithful, gentile daughter-in-law, both widowed and returning to Israel with nothing
- Timothy by Lois and Eunice: a Jewish grandmother and mother discipling a young man whose father was Greek
- Timothy by Paul: the apostle equipping a young man to become bishop of Ephesus
